

Updates to R386-702 - Utah Communicable Disease Reporting Rule

Effective June 1, 2026

Conditions Added

- *Cronobacter sakazakii*, from a normally sterile site in a person less than 12 months old
- Free-living amoebas, from any human source:
 - *Acanthamoeba spp.*
 - *Balamuthia mandrillaris*
 - *Naegleria fowleri*
- Melioidosis (*Burkholderia pseudomallei*)
- Mpox
- Oropouche virus disease, congenital and non-congenital
- St. Louis encephalitis virus disease (SLE)
- Toxoplasmosis, via electronic reporting only

Conditions Modified

- Measles, must report negative test results
- Rabies, clarified requirements and correlated with rabies compendium
- Carbapenem-resistant organisms:
 - Expanded to include the higher taxonomic order of Enterobacterales (previously at the family level of Enterobacteriaceae).
 - *Pseudomonas aeruginosa*, modified to include more strict antibiotic susceptibility to be reportable. In addition to being carbapenem resistant, it must be
 - Not susceptible to ceftolozane/tazobactam, or
 - Not susceptible to cefepime or ceftazidime when ceftolozane/tazobactam resistance is unknown

Conditions Removed

- Encephalitis and meningitis
 - Encephalitis (bacterial, fungal, parasite, protozoan, and viral)
 - Meningitis (bacterial, fungal, parasite, protozoan, and viral)
 - Still reportable are outbreaks, epidemics, or unusual occurrences involving 2+ cases of encephalitis and/or meningitis, with or without an identified organism.
- Louse-borne relapsing fever
 - Tick-borne relapsing fever is still reportable
- Methicillin-resistant *Staphylococcus aureus* (MRSA)

Changes to Non-Emergency Disease Reporting Requirements

Electronic reporting is now required for all non-emergency disease reports. The Utah Department of Health and Human Services (UDHHS) will no longer be accepting faxes for these types of reports. To ease any burdens or barriers this change may cause, UDHHS is providing access to an online reporting portal.
